How It All Started

John Beal, a Vietnam veteran, experienced post-traumatic stress disorder upon returning home from combat and found himself battling heart disease in his late twenties. Given a short-term prognosis of only a few months to live, Beal turned to the environment and began work on Hamm Creek, a tributary to the Duwamish River in Seattle, WA. Restoring Hamm Creek transformed into a metaphor for Beal's life after war. As he worked to clean up his local waterways, he also began to heal his heart, mind, and soul.

The VCC is part of the Counseling and Wellness Program of the Washington State Department of Veterans Affairs and was formed by WA State legislation in 2005 largely through the efforts and influence of John Beal.


